VHS TO DVD

Recently I updated my TV to a 42 inch flat screen. During this process, I pondered whether I should also buy a dual combo VHS tape player with a DVD recorder but I settled on a straight DVD recorder even though I had boxes of VHS tapes. After looking at them, I decided that I still liked some of the movies and at some stage would go back and watch them. It was in the back of my mind to record these movies to DVD which meant less room for storage. I worked out how to do it and below are the very simple instructions:

First I took the old VHS player and a set of leads with the correct ends on them.



On the back of your video player you will find **VIDEO OUT** and **AUDIO OUT**. These ports are colour coded - **YELLOW** for **VIDEO** and **RED** for **AUDIO**.

Plug your leads into the back of your DVD recorder into the ports marked **VIDEO IN** and **AUDIO IN**. *Now you are half way there!*

Next put your tape into your VHS player and press **PLAY**. You will then have to use your DVD remote or the buttons directly on the recorder - press **AV**. Your TV then becomes your monitor. When all the free ads on your tape are finished, press **RECORD**.

After the tape runs through the entire movie you will have your movie on a Digital Video Disc.

You must use the correct disc for your machine **-R** or **+ R** (it will state which one in your manual).

Finally you must Initialise and Finalise your disc which is a must if you want to copy it or use it on another player.

Apart from the price of the blank DVD the cost was NIL.

*If you have a printer that prints CD labels there is a site on the web called 'CD Labels and Covers'. Go to Movies and select the name for your new DVD and print your own label which will be the original label. **Chris Priestley***

Tips and Hints

To “Google” has become synonymous with searching the internet. This month we uncover handy and simple tricks to make Google your next best friend.

SEARCH FOR EXACT PHRASES USING QUOTES

By wrapping your key phrase in quotes, Google will search for the entire phrase, narrowing down your search results. Try searching for “NSW Seniors Card newsletter” with and without the quotes to see what we mean.

GOOGLE AS A CALCULATOR

Google functions as an intuitive scientific calculator. Try the following or test Google with your own equations:

- $5 + 5 * 10.5$
- $1\text{km} = ? \text{Feet}$
- $5\text{kg} = ? \text{Pound}$
- $52 \text{ days} = ? \text{Seconds}$
- $86 \text{ F} = ? \text{C}$

GOOGLE AS A CURRENCY CONVERTER

Use Google to convert international currency

Examples:

- $1 \text{ AUD} = ? \text{ USD}$
- $1 \text{ AUD} = ? \text{ Yen}$

You can also use Google to get weather details (try “Weather Sydney”). Definitions - try “define: magnifying glass”) and simple question/answer (try “population of Sydney”).

While on the subject of Google - something of interest at the moment is the 40th anniversary of the Moon landing so Google have added ‘Moon’ to their Google Earth (see below).

Change language: English (US)

With Moon in Google Earth, you can:

- Take tours of landing sites, narrated by Apollo astronauts
- View 3D models of landed spacecraft
- Zoom into 360-degree photos to see astronauts' footprints
- Watch rare TV footage of the Apollo missions

More Tips and Hints

How to send an email that includes a recording of your voice.

Windows PCs have a built-in audio recording tool. It's located in different places in various versions of Windows. XP users can go to **Start>Search>All Files & Folders** and type **Sound Recorder** into the *Name* field. Vista users can type **Sound Recorder** into the Search box above their **Start** button.

When the *Recorder* icon appears, drag it onto your Desktop. Double-click it to bring up a miniature "recording panel" with buttons for **Record, Play, Stop**, etc.

With a microphone plugged into to your computer's "Mic" jack, you can create a new voice file by clicking **File>New**. Next, click **Record** (round red button) and speak into the microphone. To end the recording, click **Stop** (square black button). To save your recording go to **File>Save As** and give it a name.

To hear your WAV, click **File>Open**. In the dialog box that appears, click on the WAV file and then click **Play**. Click **Stop** at any time. You can jump to the beginning of a sound file by clicking the "double left-arrow" button, or to its end by clicking the "double right-arrow" button.

The longest WAV that can be recorded with the above instructions is one minute.

POWERPOINT VIEWER

Many people are sending emails with PowerPoint Shows as attachments. They arrive with a .PPS extension and unless you have Microsoft Office installed you may have problems opening the attachment. Some of the PowerPoint Shows are really worth watching and it is possible to download a free PowerPoint Viewer from the Microsoft website that will enable you to any PowerPoint file that has been created with [Office 2000](#) right up to [Office 2007](#). Go to:

www.microsoft.com/downloads

All available downloads are listed in Alphabetical order. Select the letter P from the menu and then PowerPoint. Click on PowerPoint Viewer 2007 and download.
