PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It has been a pleasure to work with them throughout what has been an outstandingly successful year.

At this time last year, we had a single offshoot interest group, DigiPals. We now have two additional groups in GeneaPals and WriterPals, and the interest generated within these groups has been amazing. Not only the interest, but the success achieved by both the DigiPals and WriterPals in the ASCCA competitions last year has shown the talent which we have within the club. Our photographers achieved excellent results and all it took was a little encouragement for the members to enter the competition. Encouragement and the enthusiasm of the leaders and the members themselves have indicated that there will be even more entries this year. We only had one entry in the creative writing competition last year, but this year there will be a number of entries from this small but energetic group, so we hope to build on the success achieved by our lone entrant last year.

I believe that enthusiasm is what drives this club to accomplish what has been achieved throughout the year. Our tutors cheerfully turn up every week while most of them attend the monthly train-the-trainers sessions and participate fully in discussions. Quite apart from the tutors we have the technical group (although most of them are also tutors) which comes in every Monday morning to maintain the computers with updates. Not only do these people come in during the school terms, but a number of them even take computers home to overcome difficult-to-solve problems.

It has been many years since our website was entered in the ASCCA competitions, but during the past year it was awarded a well-deserved first place. Our webmaster is also our newsletter editor, and this year will be entering both the website and newsletter in the competitions.

Our classes have been really well attended while there has been renewed interest in the "short courses" which have taken over all of our Friday mornings and some of our Friday afternoons. We're now using the clubroom every day of the week, something that none of us envisaged in the early days of the club.

Besides purchasing a large TV, remote-controlled screen and five new computers for the clubroom, we have now introduced a membership card which will enable members (who want to take advantage of it), to present them at Domayne computers at Kotara for free VIP cards and reduced prices on photo processing. As well, Thursday evening workshops will be conducted at Domayne from the 1st September. I'm sure that some of our members will be interested in these as they will be covering topics not covered during our current courses.


By the way – I'll still be around, but in a different role!

We take a break at the Junction Inn Hotel in Raymond Terrace, a country-style pub that will be serving you a delicious hot roast lunch before making our return journey. One of the highlights will include having the Pacific Highway come to a complete stand-still as the Hexham Bridge is raised to allow for our passage. This is good value for money.

Departures and return are from / to Lee Wharf Pontoon, 5 Honeysuckle Drive Newcastle.

You Can Do The Census Return Online in 2011

What is eCensus?

"eCensus is a fast, easy and secure online option for completing your Census form.

You can complete your eCensus online at www.census.gov.au

Who can use eCensus?

Anyone who has a working internet connection can use the eCensus option. To complete the form using eCensus you will need:

- A Census Form Number
- A unique eCensus Number.

From the 29th of July, Census Collectors will commence delivery of Census information. If requested, a sealed eCensus envelope containing a unique eCensus Number will be provided to your household. If you haven't received an eCensus envelope by 7 August 2011, call the Census Inquiry Service. They can provide your Census Form Number and unique eCensus number, via SMS or mail.

How secure is eCensus?

eCensus is protected by powerful encryption technology. This offers a very high level of security and is used to protect your details from unauthorised access. The security has been independently reviewed and thoroughly tested to ensure that people's private information is secure.

What are the benefits of using eCensus?

As well as contributing to a reduction in the use of paper forms, there are many other benefits associated with using eCensus. These include:

- It is safe and secure
- It is available 24 hours a day
- It saves you time
- Built-in checks and online help makes sure your form is completed correctly
- It can be used by more than one member of a household while protecting the privacy of each user."

- There is evidence that scammers are posing as Microsoft staff members calling people and attempting to trick them into handing over access to their computers.
- While there are many scammers that try to trick us out of our money, Internet theft is probably a much more serious threat. From stealing credit card info to even our personal info for identity theft, learn how they steal our information and how to keep ourselves safe from them.
- The Google Promotion Award scam they use the name of Google in whatever they are trying to do. How exactly do they operate? What are they using the Google brand for?
- The Commonwealth Bank email Scam they pose as a bank, they
 are trying to get people to give them their bank account details and
 more.
- The latest Nigerian Scam is probably one of the most famous online danger and scam known throughout the Internet. It became famous because of the number of victims, the way those scammers work and many times, their very rough and threatening methods. While most of us think that all this has already passed, it appears that those scammers are now back with new methods and the same goal.
- The Fake Facebook login Scam how do they steal our password, and what are they going to do with it? A real potential online danger.
 Be sure to use safe passwords - mix up capitals, numerals etc.
- The Email Inbox Limit Scam is another type of email scam. While
 almost all of the email scams in the past were focused on either
 stealing our credit card information or inflicting our computer with a
 virus, there is a new type of scam recently. Yes stealing your email
 password.
- The Expired Credit Card Scam will eventually evolve, so it is important to understand how it works, what are the warning signs as well as what you can expect from it in the near future.
- The Customs Clearance Scam seems like just another email type scams, but there is more to it in its history. This scam has actually been around for decades now. It was first used as a normal scam in the real world. Today with the Internet, this scam has actually gotten more advance and dangerous.
- The Free Phone Scam. People from every age group and every gender loves them. Seeing as there is so much interest in it, the scammers have finally decided to take advantage over unsuspecting people.

- beginning of every website address. But do you really understand what it is? Basically, it is just a set of protocols that are used to connect to websites. So why would they show it to us? Simple, because there is more than one version, and they can actually show us how secure that website is. A good piece of information in avoiding most of the basic online dangers out there.
- The Tax Refund Email Scam. Another Email scam. This one tries to act as if they are from a legit government tax administrative office. An alarming problem with this scam that makes it a real online danger is that there have been a huge number of victims that has fallen for this scam. To date, this scam is very active in four countries. If you use the Australian e-tax program they have a number of security questions that only the real taxpayer would know. But you still need that firewall and antivirus protection in place.
- type scams. But there are a few things that make this different from the others. While their goal might be the same, their approach is totally different from all the others. How they look for their victim is also different. It is their fundamental difference that makes this scam really effective against us. Probably one of the scams with the highest rate of people to victim ratio.
- The Email Spyware Attachment Scam. While this is another one of those Email type scams, this scam is responsible for a large percentage of viruses and Spywares being installed into innocent people's computers. In most cases, this Email scam is one of the hardest to distinguish. It is both effective against us and very lethal. A real online danger to the unsuspecting victim.
- The Email Beneficiary Scam. This is another Email type scam. While this scam has been around for quite some time, not many people are aware of this scam yet. The reason is that the scammers do not send out as many of this email scam when compared to the rest. But the results from this scam are usually worse then the other types of email scams out there. A real online danger for those who are unaware of it.
- The random Email Survey Scam. One of the newest scams going around is the email survey scam. This scam is different from the normal survey scams that ask you to pay a fee to join. They will actually claim that if you fill out their current survey for free, they will pay you immediately. This is one of the newer scams going around, so there have been quite the number victims.

Members in our club report a company phones homes "dropping" the name Microsoft. Unwary people think the company calling is Microsoft. The callers indicate there is something wrong with their machine. Their aim seems to be to sell antivirus and malware products you may not need.
